



What is Action Research?



A systematic, iterative and social approach to problem solving, involving:

- 1. Reflecting and assessing problems and their underlying causes, forming theories of change
- 2. Planning tentative solutions
- Acting on plans (w/pivots as needed)
- 4. Observing progress, findings and impact, then -
- **5. Reflecting** once again on directions and means for potential iterations of similarly-focused initiatives.







Reflect:






- 1. Major disparity between how many students are facing food insecurity, and how many are obtaining the help they need.



Final Hand-me-down Report Rubric

Component (points) % of Points:	100%
5. REFLECT: Final Report (200 pts., of which)	
	Communicated effectively and applying appropriate rhetorical standards (e.g., audience adaptation, language, argument, organization, evidence, etc.) As applicable, report includes appendices sharing <u>any</u> written products (e.g., flyers, guidelines, survey questions and results, representative images of artifacts created, etc.). Report includes 5+ scholarly citations and references.
	Communicated effectively, applying appropriate rhetorical standards (e.g., audience adaptation, language, argument, organization, evidence, etc.)
5C. Summary and Synthesis (40)	Team's project demonstrates high capacity to measure their impact on one or more of the SDGs. Report succinctly summarizes and synthesizes key components of proposal PROBLEM STATEMENT and PLAN (Components 1 & 2 above) and progress reports (Components 3 & 4), including ACTIONS and OBSERVATIONS (final results), in order to effectively frame conclusions, lessons and recommendations.
	Where applicable, OBSERVATIONS include comprehensive summary of key findings regarding project's impact that respond to project's research question.
	Thoughtful conclusions follow directly from evidence from findings (results), linking back to address research question and (where appropriate) relevant literature and/or past START projects' reports; at least 4 lessons learned from implementation are also presented for benefit of future action researchers addressing this problem.
5E. Proposed Next Steps and Recommendations for Follow-up Projects (40)	A set of at least 4 next steps and 4 recommendations for follow-up projects to address this problem are articulated.

Benefits of Hand-me-down projects

- Actualizing multi-year partnerships & impact with practitioners (e.g., Mason Dining, OoS).
- Cohorts learn and address lessons from past.
- Alumni invested in success, offer to give back


Challenges of Hand-me-down projects

- Process-based assessment not just content or impact – with unpredictable delays & pivots.
- Inter-cohort slackers (donors & beneficiaries).
- Adhering to privacy (FERPA) via opt-in sharing.

Takeaways

- Action research (AR) can transcend semester model of learning.
- Hand-me-down design provides iterative model to extend learning beyond one course or cohort.
- The AR approach catalyzes cross-cohort scholarship, collaboration, and impact.
